Catechetical Sunday 2024 Theme and Image:



Catechetical Sunday is scheduled for September 15, 2024. The 2024 Catechetical Sunday Theme is "Lord, when did we see you hungry" "Señor, ¿cuándo te vimos hambriento?" (Matthew 25:37/Mateo 25:37)

Accompanying the 2024 theme, this icon of Servant of God Dorothy Day (to the left of this text) has been chosen by the Committee for Evangelization & Catechesis. Use of this icon has been generously granted to us by its iconographer Kelly Latimore. The image is currently being prepared with the theme, date,

For those new to parish formation leadership let me share a little more about why you should advocate with your pastor to celebrate Catechetical Sunday at your Eucharistic celebration on September 15.

Our bishops have asked that each parish not just recognize catechists but to call them forth at the Mass on September 15 to be commissioned for this official ministry of the Church. This is also an important time to recognize the domestic church as well. Catechetical Sunday is a wonderful opportunity to reflect on the role that each person plays, by virtue of Baptism, in handing on the faith and being a witness to the Gospel. Catechetical Sunday is a timer to invite catechists, in fact the entire parish community, to rededicate themselves to this mission as a community of faith.

Why is being a catechist, youth ministry team member, Bible study small group leader, RCIA team member, Catholic School teacher, etc. something that deserves a special day for commissioning?

Catechesis is a distinct and special ministry in the Church. As the Catechism of the Catholic Church makes clear, "Catechesis is intimately bound up with the whole of the Church's life... her inner growth and correspondence with God's plan depend essentially on catechesis" (no. 7). This ministry of teaching in the name of the Church has a profound dignity, which is why catechists are formally commissioned by the Church. It is only fitting that we set aside a day to highlight this ministry and invite the entire church community to think about our responsibility to share our faith with others.

Interim Phase Synodal Synthesis:



Attached is the Synodal Synthesis that has been sent to the USCCB. It is close to five pages in length. The first page highlights the process that helped illuminate this synthesis. This project was received from the Vatican and the USCCB once we returned from Christmas break with the request to have two to three listening sessions to assess perceived movement since the original synodal listening sessions occurred. Since our six diocesan pastoral priorities were the fruit of our initial synodal conversations, they were

used to focus the conversations for this interim phase. The short report is written to reflect key themes where those who participated experienced signs of growth, signs of stagnancy, and thoughts on how to enhance encounter, friendship, and communion in our parish communities. I hope you have a chance to see the many ways the faithful are experiencing growth, and not solely focusing on areas they feel we need to be better.

The Invite One Back Initiative:



Invite One Back is an invitation for you and your fellow parishioners to identify which parishioners haven't returned to your parish since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic and to invite them back to Mass.

There is a simple process for your pastor, with staff and parish leadership, to discern who will receive the invitations and how best to reach out to them. Once the list is created there is also an opportunity to develop a team of prayer warriors who can

pray for each person and family by name.

The toolkits include templates for letters, postcards, and even a phone call campaign. All the resources are available in Spanish and English. There are also training videos available in Spanish and English.

This invitation is all about outreach—sharing what we have received and allowing ourselves to act as vessels for God's love and mercy.

Parish Listening Sessions Executive Summary:



Many of our pastors and some in parish leadership spent time with a member of our Evangelization and Mission Team, Anne Marie Cox, or Jason Kurth to share a little bit about the parish community. Although we were hoping to connect with 90% of our pastors and their parish leadership, we did achieve 85% this first go around. Learning more about what is going well, the challenges and missed opportunities has had a significant impact on our work here at the Pastoral Center. Our budget plan for FY 2025 was impacted by what was shared. It was a privilege to also be with members of parish pastoral councils, finance committees, trustees, and staff. The attached executive summary captures what we heard and what we will be attentive to as we move forward partnering with pastors and their leadership on what is needed to help strengthen parish initiatives. Beginning on page 4 you will see some of the parishes we discovered had possible best practices that could be helpful if that is an area of challenge in your parish community. This is not an exhaustive list at all. We found bright spot examples in every parish we visited with. We look forward to being with everyone again this fall to continue the conversation.

Free digital retreat from NCCL – June 5 from 12:00 to 3:00 pm:




